ASSIGNMENT 1 – DURING READING: DOUBLE-ENTRY JOURNAL

While you read you will record your thinking and interactions with the text using the double-entry journal format. Directions for how to complete the journal are below:

- 1. The left column is used to record significant quotations from the text. The quotations you choose do not have to be character dialogue. A quotation can range from a single sentence to a short paragraph, as long as it is important or meaningful to your understanding of the book.

 Place the text excerpt in quotation marks and include the page number.
- 2. The right column is used for commenting on the quotations; your commenting options are listed below. Effective readers respond to text in a variety of ways; therefore, YOU MUST USE EACH OF THE OPTIONS BELOW AT LEAST ONCE.

Your comments on the right must include:

- Comments about the writer's use of literary devices (metaphor, symbolism, personification, irony, and the like)
- Analysis of the quote's connection to plot, character development, conflict, or theme
- Your reactions to the author's word choice (diction) or sentence structure (syntax)
- Questions about what was read (meaning, purpose, character motivation)
- Connections such as text-to-text, text-to-world, or text-to-self
- Predictions or inferences
- Four more entries of your choice from the topics listed here.

Your double-entry journal must contain 10 entries. There should be one entry for each of the following sections: 1-11, 12-38, 39-66, 67-96, 97-135, 136-163, 164-183, 184-203, 204-217, and one for the novel as a whole.

Remember, your responses, thoughts, ideas, questions, and comments must be your own.

Here is an example of how a double-entry journal must be formatted and what it should include:

ASSIGNMENT 2- THEMATIC TEXT-TO-TEXT CONNECTIONS

- 1. Find a poem or song lyrics that thematically connect to the novel, school appropriate, of course. Copy and paste them into your Part II document. Be sure to cite the source from which they came. Use OWL at Purdue or Google to help you with the format.
- 2. In a formal essay, explain the theme you selected with evidence from the novel. Next, explain the piece you selected. Then, discuss the connection the novel has with the piece you selected. Since there are three parts to your essay, each part must be in its own paragraph. You should have 5 paragraphs in total: intro, 3 body paragraphs, conclusion
- 3. This document should be entirely original work using your own thoughts and connections. You will be scored based on the quality of your explanations of the theme, the texts, and the connections you make between the piece you selected and the novel. You will also be scored on proper formatting, grammar and mechanics, vocabulary usage, and style.
